Official Earth Day 1990 activities began on campus this week with an Arbor Day celebration centered around the planting of 100 Japanese flowering cherry trees on the south campus greenbelt.

More than 300 community residents as well as business and industry representatives joined in the event, with groups of five or more people spreading mulch around each tree to complete the planting. Clark was well represented with planting groups from Executive Team, ACE, Plant Services (who did the real planting earlier), Focus On Mature Learning, the Baptist Student Union, Horticulture Club, The Independent, ASCC Executive Council and Clark College Foundation.

On hand later in the day was Gov. Booth Gardner, who used the occasion to sign into law a bill which gives parents new flexibility in choosing the schools their children can attend. The bill also allows students to attend community college on a part-time basis while still in high school, so they can earn a high school diploma and an associate of arts degree at the same time. Also attending were the bill's primary sponsor Rep. Kim Peery, Sen. Al Bauer, Sen. Dean Sutherland, and Rep. Holly Myers. After the signing ceremony, Gardner joined Vancouver Mayor Bruce Hagensen and John Kageyama to dedicate tree #1 of the 100 trees donated by American Kotobuki Electronics, Inc. where Kageyama is president.
