

Clark College hosting NWAACC all-stars in last basketball games

Men's, women's tilts Sunday at O'Connell Center

Erving Adams will play one last game in Clark College's O'Connell Center on Sunday, when the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) basketball all-star series comes to Vancouver.

Adams, a 6-foot-3 sophomore forward, will suit up for the West Division men, who play the South at 5 p.m.

The day begins with the East women against the North at 11 a.m., followed by the West women against the South at 1 p.m. The East and North men tangle at 3 p.m.

All players involved are sophomores, which means their NWAACC eligibility has expired.

Admission costs \$5.

Adams, who attended high school in North Carolina, was named this week a second-team all-star in the West Division. He averaged 15 points and more than nine rebounds a game for the Penguins, who suffered through a 3-24 season, including 1-15 in their division.

Adams is being recruited by a handful of NCAA Division II and III and NAIA programs, Clark coach Mike Arnold said.

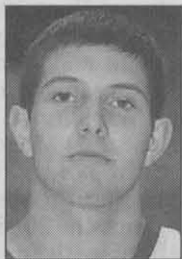
"He's just so athletic," Arnold said. "Erving can do a lot of things."

The Penguin women will not be represented in the games, but they did produce an all-star of their own.

Freshman forward Maryam Razavi was named a second-team West all-star after helping Clark go 9-20, including 5-11 in the division. The Tualatin, Ore., product averaged close to 12 points and seven rebounds a game.



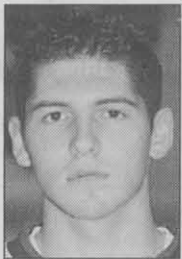
