Complete a Career Assessment

- The **Myers-Briggs Type Indicator** (MBTI) identifies and describes your strengths and unique preferences and helps you to answer the questions: “What would I enjoy doing?” and “How can I use my strengths to reach my career goal?”
- The **Strong Interest Inventory** (SII) identifies what you most enjoy doing by comparing your responses to those answers given by people who really love their jobs (in 122 different fields)
- Each assessment includes scoring, a printed career report and a 1½ hour small group interpretation with a counselor
- The cost for each assessment is \$20
