Symptoms

- Coughing
- Tight feeling in the chest
- Shortness of Breath
- Wheezing
- Runny nose
- Congestion
- Eye irritation

Exams and Tests to Confirm Diagnosis

- Blood tests to look for antibodies
- Bronchial provocation test
- Chest x-ray
- Complete blood count



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Treatment

- See a doctor to discuss treatment options necessary for your asthma.
- It may be necessary to change jobs.
- Asthma quick-relief medications can be taken as needed.
- Asthma control medication can be taken daily.
