Toner and Inkjet Cartridge Recycling

America alone uses over 350 million cartridges per year of which only 20% are recycled. Each cartridge can be re-used an average of 4-7 times. Remanufacturing plastic uses 80% less energy than making it from scratch. Re-using cartridges helps conserve natural resources and keeps them out of landfills where they can take centuries to decompose. To help cut back on cartridges and save on supplies, print only when necessary and use black and white ink instead of color.
