College Budget

Sabra Sand, Vice President of Operations, presented a high-level overview of the 2025–26 draft college budget. The total projected operating budget is \$91,970,242, with \$1,388,679 in expenditure increases and the use of \$669,139 from the fund balance. Net revenue is projected to increase by \$719,540. Key considerations include federal financial aid changes, cost increases related to salaries, healthcare, and software, a 2.5% increase in Running Start rates, and a 3.3% tuition rate increase. The Governor recently signed the state budget, and allocation details from

the State Board are forthcoming. The budget remains an estimate and will change once the final state allocation is received.

ASCC S&A Budget

Dorji Damdul, ASCC Finance Director, presented the 2025–26 Services & Activities (S&A) budget. The committee received \$2,790,571 in funding requests and recommended a \$2,570,377 budget, based on a projected \$2,084,779 in fee revenue and the use of \$456,898 from the fund balance. The presentation highlighted two programs that were not funded: Aerospace and World Language Spanish. There is no change to the S&A fee rate, which remains at the 2020–21 level. Damdul noted increased student engagement.

Student Profile

Dr. Cecelia Martin, Associate Vice President of Planning and Effectiveness, and Dr. Mark Wahlers, Interim Vice President of Student Affairs, shared a high-level overview of the spring student profile. They reported a 13.8% increase in headcount from Spring 2023 to Spring 2025 and acknowledged Student Affairs and ODEI for their recruitment efforts. CCE enrollment for spring is 860.

Constituent Reports

ASCC

Gurraj Dhami, ASCC President, reported strong student engagement this spring, including over 260 participants at the Spring Involvement Fair. ASCC chartered 14 clubs, placed 11 students on committees, and gathered campus feedback through the "Let Your Voice Be Heard" initiative. Social media outreach continues to grow, with 1,607 Instagram followers sharing resources and event updates. The Penguin Pantry distributed over 19,000 pounds of food in April.

WPEA

Courtney Braddock, WPEA Representative, reported on the WPEA and CCAHE Solidarity Celebration. WPTE & STEM Secretary Senior Stephanie Hall was recognized as the 2025 WPEA Member of the Year. Braddock stated that WPEA submitted a letter to President Edwards in support of state funding of the ratified 2025–2027 WPEA Higher Education Contract. The contract was not included in the final state budget signed on May 20. The budget outcome affects over 400 classified staff at Clark College, who will not receive scheduled cost-of-living adjustments in FY 2026. WPEA expressed concern about the lack of communication from leadership regarding advocacy efforts.

CCAHE

AHE did not give an oral report. A written document was received the day of the meeting and will be included in next month's Board packet.

Foundation

Calen Ouellette, CEO of the Clark College Foundation, reported on upcoming board leadership changes, with Debra Blom and Gabe Jacobson set to begin two-year terms as Chair and Vice Chair. He noted the renaming of the softball field to Raines Softball Field in recognition of a significant gift from the Raines family. Ouellette also shared that community interest in naming opportunities is growing. The Foundation is preparing to engage new graduates through Penguin Nation materials supported by a new data-sharing agreement.

Penguin Early College (PEC) Center

Dani DePuy-Grobbel, Associate Director of Dual Enrollment, gave an overview of the Penguin Early College (PEC) Center and Running Start program. She reported that Clark enrolled approximately 2,100 Running Start students in Fall 2023, with an additional 30–50 underage students, with 22% engaging in PEC Center services. The center provides academic support, mentorship, social programming, and basic needs resources. Students served through the center showed higher full-time enrollment, stronger academic performance, and greater BIPOC representation than the general Running Start population. DePuy-Grobbel highlighted recent initiatives such as peer mentoring, family support events, and K-12 partnerships. She outlined plans for expanded outreach, assessment, and orientation programming in the coming year.

Reports from the Board Members

Trustee Donaldson

Trustee Donaldson reported attending the Noche de Familia event on campus, the Board of Trustees budget meeting, and a one-on-one meeting with Dr. Edwards.

Vice Chair Scarbrough

Vice Chair Scarbrough reported attending the ACT Spring Conference and highlighted three key sessions: artificial intelligence, trustee support for presidents, and governance through policy. She also attended the Arts@Clark event at Art at the Cave Gallery, noting that the gallery owner is a former Clark College student and the event featured student and faculty artwork.

Trustee Bennett

Trustee Bennett reported attending the ACT Spring Conference and shared a key takeaway emphasizing the importance of staying focused on student success despite external challenges. She noted that the Cowlitz Indian Tribe was recognized as the ACT Partner of the Year. Trustee Bennett also expressed interest in seeing Clark College submit nominations for ACT awards in the future.

Trustee Canseco Juarez

Trustee Canseco Juarez reported attending the VCLI graduation ceremony held on campus and highlighted the organization's work in preparing leaders of color for service on local boards and commissions. He spoke about ongoing partnership opportunities between Clark College and community organizations. He also noted his attendance at the Heather McGhee event and extended well wishes to students and faculty as the quarter concludes.

Chair Gideon

Chair Gideon reported attending the Leadership Clark County event to celebrate Rhianna Johnson's receiving of the Community Impact Award following last month's board meeting. She also attended Black Family Night, which focused on increasing enrollment of Black families at Clark College, and praised the keynote speaker, Clarissa Hightower. Chair Gideon held a Chair/Vice Chair meeting with Dr. Edwards and attended the Heather McGhee event. She thanked students, faculty, and staff for their continued efforts as the academic year concludes.

Report from the President

President Edwards reported that Nate Humphrey has been named the next Executive Director of the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges. She shared updates on the BUILD leadership development program, including the graduation of 22 participants, and acknowledged ongoing legislative concerns related to proposed federal financial aid changes. She noted continued engagement with elected officials, including representatives from Senator Murray's and Congresswoman Gluesenkamp Perez's offices. Updates were also provided on the Vice President of Student Affairs search, recent economic development discussions through CREDC, and community engagement efforts, including the Heather McGhee event and the upcoming commencement ceremony. President Edwards confirmed that accessibility policy concerns raised at the last meeting were addressed and documented in the board packet.

Background:

During the 2024-25 year, the college has seen state funded enrollments continue to increase in both traditional students as well as Running Start students. We are encouraged by these increases and are projecting them to continue for the 2025-26 year.

For the 2025-26 fiscal year, the College faced a projected deficit before tuition and Running Start rate increases of about \$669,000. At the same time, the college has an adequate fund balance, so we felt it prudent to hold steady and not implement any reductions or allocate additional funds. Our decision took into account the current state and federal budgetary climates, which both directly impact our students and our college budget. Tuition rates will increase slightly, along with Running Start reimbursements rates, reducing the reliance on fund balance.

Looking forward to the 2026-27 fiscal year, we will continue to use the Strategic Plan to drive future the budget decisions and provide alignment between strategic tenets and budget decisions. We are excited to use the key performance indicators to evaluate if additional funding and initiatives increase our metrics.

The 2025-26 budget is now ready for you to submit to the Board of Trustees on June 11. Key elements of this budget include the following:

- The College is projecting to serve 5,000 state-support FTES, up 57 from the 2024-25 budget.
- The College is projecting to serve 1,675 Running Start FTES, up 90 from the 2024-25 budget.
- Running Start reimbursement rates increased by about 2.5%; tuition rates increased by 3.3%.
- The College is funding a small portion of the new on-going cost by allocating approximately \$669,000 from the fund balance.

Recommendation:

I recommend approval of the College's 2025-26 operating budget per the attached documents:

Page 1. State Allocation & Projected Revenue: total budget of \$140,249,625 for all funds.

Page 2. 2025-26 Budget by Uses of Revenue illustrates the allocation of resources among

the divisions of the College.

Student Involvement & Campus Climate

ASCC Student Government recognizes the increase in student involvement with clubs and programs and in response will continue to create, support, and promote student involvement in ASCC clubs and programs, and events.

Activities to support this priority:

- ASCC Oswald Awards celebrated 149 students nominated by Faculty/staff.
- Spring Fest was held at Andersen Fountain. This event had 630 student participation. It offered music, games, food, and interactive activities that celebrated the end of the academic year.
- The Fall Guy (Daytime Movie) was a relaxed, midday movie showing at Gaiser Student Center on May 19th, with 70 students enjoying the film and social time.
- Llamazing Time with Llamas was held at Andersen Fountain on May 28th. This event drew 235 students who enjoyed feeding, petting, and taking photos with llamas, providing a unique stress-relief experience before finals.

Student Resource Access

The ASCC Student Government will advocate for the provision, allocation, and management of accessible resources for Clark students to ensure student success.

Activities to support this priority:

- ASCC's social media presence continues to grow, reaching 1,618 Instagram followers, helping disseminate essential resource information to students.
- In May, the Penguin Pantry distributed 18,950 pounds of food, supporting 413 students, 1,644 household members, totaling 1,134 visits.

Clark College State-Wide Initiatives

The ASCC Student Government understands the significance of partnering with state-wide groups such as Washington Student Engagement Network (WA-SEN) and the Washington Community and Technical Colleges Students Association (WACTCSA), so will develop outreach to state-wide groups to advocate for funding and the interests of Clark College students at the state level. Additionally, the ASCC Student Government recognizes the benefits in partnering with nearby colleges to increase community involvement and student engagement, so will build upon partnerships with nearby colleges, such as WSUV to provide students opportunities to engage in their college and community.

Congratulations to the Class of 2025:

The Clark College WPEA would like to congratulate the graduates of 2025! This time of year is so exciting to be able to see students that staff have worked with achieve their goals. We look forward to seeing students continue to impact the community even after their journey at Clark comes to an end.

WPEA Higher Ed Contract Bargaining- College Leadership Advocacy:

From Sabra Sand's most recent email regarding the upcoming fiscal state budget:

"It's disappointing that the final state budget did not include funding for the WPEA contract, though there was support and advocacy, the outcome is outside of our control."

While we would not argue that any leadership at the college makes the final decision on the state budget, college leaders such as the President and Board of Trustee's members have significant influence when speaking with state legislatures.

For example, during last year's legislative session, House Bill 2172 proposed to provide vacant state agency property be used by local government during a declared emergencies related to homelessness. A small piece of Clark's vacant property, along with other Vancouver properties, was being considered. Multiple Clark College Board of Trustee's members went to the legislature to testify in opposition of the bill. After that testimony, Clark College was no longer considered.

In contrast, during last summer's WPEA bargaining session, the WPEA came to Dr. Edwards and the Board of Trustee's multiple times, asking to support a COLA that would make a positive impact to our members lives and help stop the bleeding of classified staff that Clark College, and many other colleges, are feeling. The response was to include a request of 13% over the biennium for admin/exempt employees, specifically excluding classified staff. This number was never brought to the bargaining table by the college's bargaining representative. This is a pattern we've seen for over the last 20 years.

Quoting again from Sabra's email "We deeply value our classified employees and their continued vital contributions every day to the college and our community."

The history of where the college prioritizes its collective action and legislative muscle is not currently, nor has it been, used for our classified staff. And being ignored by our own president when asking for support is just another example of many.

When and how will classified staff be deeply valued by Clark College? When will we hear this sentiment at the bargaining table? How are you going to support Clark College's classified staff now that we are even further behind? We are asking you to walk the walk and not just give lip service.

We want to remind college leadership that our membership makes up nearly half of the employees at the college. We clean your classrooms and offices, we reconcile your budgets, we process student financial aid, we keep the campus safe, we ensure that your technology works, we keep the college grounds pristine. We are the faces our students and community see when they enter our campus. We know we matter, and we will continue to push for what we deserve. It is now your turn, Clark College Leadership, to show us we matter.

As we head back to the bargaining table, be involved and at the table. Push YOUR bargaining representative to represent your needs and how you deeply value your classified staff. Anything less is unacceptable.

As of June 3, 2025, we still have not received a response from Dr. Edwards regarding the letter that requested her to advocate for classified staff in Olympia. In fact, the only communication that we've seen from the President was a mention of "disappointment" that the final state budget did not include funding for our contract in the President's Weekly.

We've received many responses from members who are disturbed by this response. The messaging in this response completely lacks any responsibility on Clark College's end. The work to ensure our contracts are fully implemented go beyond the bargaining table and require advocacy at the legislature. We have not seen any advocacy from Clark College at the bargaining table or Clark College showing up in Olympia for classified staff. We would hope that Dr. Edwards would widely share her communication, both individual and as a community college President, to help our members see how we are deeply valued, and that the college is doing all it can to go to bat for us. But we have not seen any of these supposed communications.

We also want to dispel the assertion that Clark College does not have authority to make local compensation decisions for classified positions. For example, it was recently announced at Greys Harbor Community College, one of the college's that bargains at the WPEA Higher Education Coalition table, announced that as of July 1, 2025, all full-time classified staff would receive a \$1500 retention bonus, and all part-time classified staff would receive a \$750 retention bonus. This effort was made by Greys Harbor leadership to show goodwill to their classified staff, using local funds to help alleviate the gap in pay members would see in FY 2026. At Highline Community College, their leadership announced that they would be working to move all classified staff into higher classifications or up steps in their current pay ranges to make up the gap in pay that they would not be receiving in FY 2026.

The narrative that Clark College has no say is false. While the Office of Financial Management (OFM) is the representative at the bargaining table, the 13 colleges that make up the coalition pay over \$100,000 a quarter for OFM to represent the college in labor relations. OFM works for the college, NOT the other way around. This is just another way that the college has continuously skirted accountability regarding advocating for classified staff. We will not continue to allow this narrative to go on without push back. If OFM's representation does not represent the college's needs at the bargaining table, it is on the college to push back or find an alternative to labor relations work, potentially like college's that WPEA represents that do not utilize OFM. But without the college pushing back against how OFM represents them, it is hard to tell our members that OFM does not represent the college and its advocacy, or rather, their lack of advocacy, for classified staff.

It takes time and effort on leadership's part to ensure that classified staff are paid fairly. Something that Clark College leadership has not bothered to take the time to investigate. We consistently remind leadership how to properly advocate for us. And when something falls short, there is no accountability taken.

It is disappointing that Clark College does not put in the same amount of effort to take care of us as we do for our work and our students. The college will continue to harm Clark students if it neglects the staff that run so much of its operations. We need concreate solutions from our leadership on how to repair the damages classified staff have experienced from prior bargaining sessions and we need Clark College's advocacy for classified staff to be transparent.

As always, the Clark College WPEA leadership team is always available to meet with Clark College leadership to discuss next steps and hope that someday soon, college leadership actually take us up on that offer.
