

Career and Technical Student Follow-up 2009-10

September 2011

Introduction

Each year, the Office of Planning and Effectiveness uses Perkins funding to complete a follow-up of Career and Technical students. The purpose of this report is to measure student's perception of how well the program prepared them for their career and to support continuous improvement efforts. It does this by collecting student's feedback about the college and the student's program. Currently, this survey is the only instrument available to provide annual feedback for individual programs. Because program sample sizes are small, the results of this survey can only be used as indicators. At the college level, this report provides data to benchmark and set goals for student outcomes related to program completion.

A total of 780 students were surveyed for the 2009-10 report. These students fell into two groups. Graduates completed a transcriptable degree or certificate during the 2009-10 academic year, and leavers stopped attending classes after earning 45 or more career or technical credits in a single program. For the 2009-10 report, Planning and Effectiveness surveyed 561 graduates and 219 leavers. A total of 176 students: 148 graduates, 26 leavers, and 2 unknown status responded to the survey, for a 23% response rate (26% for graduates, and 12% for leavers).

Highlights

- 82% of students feel they accomplished their primary goal during their time at Clark College.
- 45% of employed graduates earned more than \$18 an hour when surveyed.
- 72% of employed graduates were employed in their field of study.
- 78% of students reported that Clark College prepared them in their program of study.
- 79% of students reported feeling that Clark College prepared them in a manner consistent with current industry standards.
- 64% of graduates were satisfied or very satisfied with their current employment situation.

Methodology and Definitions

Students who had an email address on file were first contacted via email. Students who did not respond to the email were then sent a paper survey. If they did not respond to the survey, they were sent a follow-up postcard. Students who received a paper survey could either return the paper survey in the enclosed postage-paid envelope, or they could complete the electronic version. Of the 780 students surveyed, 176 students responded (23%). This response rate is acceptable.

Graduates are students who earned a transcripted degree or certificate during the 2009-10 academic year. Of the 561 graduates, 148 responded (26%). Transcriptable degrees and certificates do not include short-term training program completions or short-term program certificates.

Leavers are students who were enrolled in a career/technical program with an intent to complete a degree or certificate and who had earned 45 or more career/technical credits before leaving the college. Twelve (12) of those credits must have been earned in the previous two years. Of the 219 leavers, 26 responded (12%).

The term **student** refers to both graduates and leavers.



Goal Accomplishment

★ 82% of students reported they accomplished their primary goal.

While the majority of students reported they accomplished their primary goal, almost one in five students did not. Their responses are listed below, grouped by the primary goal they indicated. Of the students (31) who indicated they did not accomplish their goal, half were leavers (16).

Earn a certificate

- Although the certificate doesn't really prepare you for the test for coding
- Was not able to receive proper demonstrations due to instructors lack of up to date certifications
- I don't feel that I was taught everything that I could have been and I don't feel that the teacher was well equipped to teach

Earn an Associate's Degree

- Present employment environment is not conducive to planned goal
- They cancelled my course in Electronics Technology
- Still attending classes in pursuit of a degree.
- I'm incarcerated now and the facilty I'm at doesn't give me the access that I need to accomplished my goals.
- I am still enrolled, I had gotten a certificate for completing IBEST but still continuing for AA
- Not finished am still going for an AA Degree at attending WSU.
- Classed were hard to manage due to when they were time & quarter. need more choices.
- The ECE guidance counselor messed up on the classes I should take so I was left missing one class.
- I had to take a break due to work and family prioritys. I did complete phelbotomy cert. program but could not get hired anywhere very displeased.
- I feel I possess the level of skills and knowledge to have earned an AAS in Automotive Technology, but do not have the time for one welding class that is required.
- Still in process

Improve or gain new skills

- Skills learned or gained in said program did not help move into a new career field.
- Clark did not offer the classes I wanted. Many classes listed in the college catalog were not taught due to lack of instructior. Had to substitute classes out of my area of interest
- Program did not prepare for employment
- Have not found full time work w/benefits
- Would like to take remaining classes to finish Medical Office Specialist degree
- It was hard for me with no experience in computers to be pushed so fast through the computer classes. The people who do well are those who know already how to work programs.
- I learned nothing that I couldn't learn on my own
- Didnt have money to complete second year
- I would like more classes in this field
- I would like to have seen more teacher instuction in class. One hour, I felt was too brief.


Other goals

★ 64% of all graduates were satisfied with their current employment situation.

Graduates were asked "How satisfied are you with your current employment situation? (whether employed or not?)" While almost two thirds of graduates who responded were satisfied, there were a total of 58 who were dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with their current employment situation.

★ 67% of students were employed. Of those graduates who wanted to work, 75% were employed.



Of the 115 employed students, 62% are working full-time and 38% are working part-time.

★ 74% of employed graduates earned more than \$12.00 per hour. 45% earn more than \$18.00 per hour.

Wage Category of Employed Graduates




★ 57% of employed students were employed in Vancouver, and an additional 12% were employed in other Washington locations. 31% were employed out of state (22% in Portland, 6% elsewhere in Oregon, and 3% in other states).



- ★ 87% of employed students were working locally (Clark, Skamania, Klickitat, Multnomah, Washington, and Clackamas counties).
- ★ 39% of students were not able to find employment within 6 months. Another 27% were already employed and the other third found employment within 6 months.

★ More than 70% of working students were employed in their field of study.

Students working out of their field of study were asked for an explanation. Most have been unable to find jobs in their fields of study, or have found that entry level jobs do not pay enough to meet their needs. While others do not have the experience necessary in the field.



- **★** 78% of graduates indicated that Clark College prepared them for employment in their field of study.
- ★ 79% of graduates indicated that Clark College prepared them in a manner consistent with current industry standards.





★ 43% of students (75) indicated areas of improvement for their program of study.

Skills specific to a program will be included in the individual program reports. Only items with broader applicability are included in this report.


What additional skills would have been helpful for you to learn in your program?

- State of art computer languages
- Probably more hands on experience classes
- Patient interaction from beginning to end in the clinic setting
- More practice time on basic clinical requirements
- Paperwork in the real world, charts
- Organization, delegation, prioritizing
- More troubleshooting for software and hardware.
- Hands on classes not learning about how-to from a book
- More information and experience with the electronic health record
- Skills related to finding jobs in the industry
- More interactive classroom activities with the outcome including a better understanding of the material being presented
- More hands on training less academic it is a vocational career
- Need a Clinical Coordinator and mentoring after the classroom experience to place students in clinical sites for externship and follow progress
- More emphasis on interviewing skills and behavioral interviewing technique
- More demonstration from instructor in a classroom
- More actually doing the stuff I was learning

- Examples/ simulated equipment students have access to, to prepare them for related fields
- I think that a more complete review class would be helpful
- A combination of classes, doing more hands on, rather than class after class of lecture

Employment Benefits

★ 130 of the 176 students (74%) reported receiving at least one benefit from their coursework at Clark College.



• 62% of students indicated that they have current or future educational plans.
