DEPARTMENT ANNOUCEMENTS

The new Dean (Tina) started two months ago, and she shared some of her background with the committee. The college has launched the new Strategic Plan with focus on equity initiatives and social justice. Tina shared the focus on community partnerships and how education programs are leading the way on this.

UPDATE ON ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The committee members introduced themselves, sharing where they work and what they are involved in as it relates and serves the industry and committee.

Jamie shared that PCC is working through the reorganization it went through a few years ago, including a new president this year. There has been an increase in enrollment within the program. The department is working with entities across the state to align practicum across all community colleges in the state. They have developed an onsite childcare tied to colleges consortium to support each other at the colleges. Not all sites are tied to programs like they are at Clark. The funding for early childhood is being used to purchase headsets for students to provide additional live interpretation to occur in the classroom. Translators are also being used to translate resources to Spanish as well. They are partnering with Multnomah County to hire a bilingual advisor who will work as a recruiter as well in the community. Andrew Garland with Family Human Service Degree is seeking national accreditation, with 20 students in the coming practicum term. This is no longer required to be completed on site, so they can go anywhere if the criteria are met at the location. Workforce is looking to pay internships has also been established for students in the program. They are working on an articulation with the BASTE program at Clark.

BASTE PROGRAM

The question put before the committee was what professional skills are essential for ECE students to demonstrate, noting the importance of how to put them into practical exercises in class and how to do this when practicum with children may not always be available. The first cohort launched in the fall, with 5 students. There has been a great deal of interest in the community and have hosted several events to introduce potential students. The program has added several endorsements, having started with early childhood and bilingual, the program has now added an elementary and special education endorsement. Meghan shared how students are recruited and apply to the program.

PARTNERSHIP AND CERTIFICATES

The committee discussed the prompts regarding having students apply professionalism and professional standards in the classroom and what that means to the industry. For example, the committee reviewed the outcomes of ECED& 120, focusing on #2. What skills are essential and what should students be practicing. Working collaboratively with peers has been mentioned. Student interns do great with the children, but could use support in how to communicate, including how to interact during staff and family meetings.

Skills employers seek include training to take on leadership roles. What does it mean, how to collaborate, and how that looks like as a supervisor. Defining professionalism can be difficult because it is also interpreted based on several variables, but the skills that are tied to it are more readily understood and it is helpful to consider both. Building bridges and communication while also maintaining healthy boundaries in a kind and loving way is a key skill.
