The Clark College Jazz Band



he Clark College Jazz Band is the premier jazz group at Clark College and holds an international reputation of excellence. Participation in the ensemble is by audition and, while jazz improvisation skills are not mandatory, they are highly encouraged. Throughout the year, students are guided through an active learning curriculum on correct performance techniques for different jazz styles and repertoire. Additionally, students are exposed to a wide variety of jazz-related subjects from jazz improvisation and history to understanding Latin/Afro-Cuban jazz rhythms. Above all, teamwork and leadership are a focused learning outcome. The Jazz Ensemble has performed internationally and received critical acclaim at many prestigious jazz festivals throughout the United States and Mexico where our students received numerous recognitions for outstanding musicianship. We are also proud

that many of our students desiring to go on to four-year music programs have successfully transitioned to Jazz Studies programs such as Washington State University, Central Washington University, and the University of North Texas.

Another popular jazz curriculum offering is the online humanities course, MUSC 135 Jazz Appreciation. This class is intended for all levels of jazz enthusiasts, from the casual jazz listener to the full-fledged jazz performer. During the term students are guided through an active learning process on how to listen to jazz, a chronology of jazz periods and the societal events that encouraged these transitions, and the biographies of key performers.

Clark College Jazz Festival Director, Dr. Doug Harris



Dr. Doug Harris is the Director of Bands at Clark College since fall of 2018 after after serving as Assistant Director of Bands at Western Kentucky University, and Director of Bands at both Santa Clara University and Southern Utah University. He also enjoyed a long and distinguished career as a high school band director in Florida.

Dr. Harris received his Bachelor of Music Education from the University of Florida, his Master of Music and Doctor of Arts from the University of Northern Colorado. His conducting teachers include Richard W. Bowles, Dr. Raymond Chobaz, Dr. German Gutierez, Dr. Richard Mayne and Dr. Kenneth Singleton, and has studied conducting with Douglas Akey, Stanley Derusha, John Paynter and Frank Batiste. At his most recent high school, Palm Bay High School in Melbourne, FL., his concert and jazz bands were recognized as

being among the elite in the state, regularly receiving highest marks at district and state festivals. The Wind Ensemble was invited to perform at the University of Florida Invitational Concert Band Festival as well as the prestigious Bands of America National Concert Band Festival in Indianapolis. The top jazz band performed at, and won, jazz

festivals in Florida, Georgia and Virginia, and has earned praise while performing with jazz notables such as Ira Sullivan, Bill Prince, Marc Dickman, Christian Tamburr, Maynard Ferguson, David Steinmeyer and Bobby Shew.

Dr. Harris is active as an adjudicator and clinician, working with and adjudicating for bands from Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, Missouri, Colorado, Utah, California and Washington. He is active as an arranger and transcriber and is published in the Grand Mesa Music catalog.

Dr. Harris is a member of the International Trumpet Guild, Washington Music Educators Association, California Band Directors Association, Oregon Band Directors Association, National Association for Music Education, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia and Kappa Kappa Psi (honorary).

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HISTORY OF THE CLARK COLLEGE JAZZ FESTIVAL

The heritage of the Clark College Jazz Festival dates back to 1962 when Hudson's Bay H.S. band director, Don Cammack, began organizing a one day high school stage band invitational for schools from Clark and Skamania counties. Organized by the Vancouver and Evergreen public schools, Fort Vancouver H.S. and Evergreen H.S. took turns hosting the festival each year. Sponsors of the festival included Southwest Washington Music Association and Lower Columbia River Music Educators Association. In the early years, the trophies were made by middle school band director, Jack Ager, creatively constructing musician figures from miscellaneous hardware and car parts! In 1970, Dale Beacock, then the band director at both Fort Vancouver H.S. and Clark College, held the invitational "Clark Stage Band Contest" for the first time at its current home, Clark College. This inaugural event hosted 17 high school jazz bands with preliminary competitions held in what was then known as the Gaiser Hall dining area, with finals in the gymnasium. Dale's vision of a competitive jazz showcase for schools throughout Washington and greater Portland promoted the growth of the festival and in 1971 the festival grew to 32 bands held over two days on Friday and Saturday. In 1976 the number of participating bands grew to 52, welcoming bands from Oregon and Idaho. In 1985, Chuck Ramsey took over the reigns as Festival Coordinator successfully organizing the festival for the next 22 years. Chuck's achievements bringing consistency in the operations of the festival and increased student involvement set the groundwork for the educational enhancement, leadership, teamwork, and a sense of ownership the Clark student volunteers experience today. In 2008, Richard Inouye came onboard as Festival Director. His professional and educational experience has brought a new dynamic to the festival by encouraging a focus on jazz education and utilizing technology to promote community awareness, public support, and streamline festival operations. In 2012, the Clark College Jazz Festival celebrated its 50th Golden Anniversary. Highlights of this milestone included the Clark College Alumni Band directed by Chuck Ramsey which featured Clark band alumni from three generations of Clark band directors. Dale Beacock and Chuck were also presented Legacy Sweepstakes Awards for their historic contributions to the festival. Today the Annual Clark College Jazz Festival welcomes 60 middle and high school jazz ensembles, over 1,200 student jazz musicians to the campus, and over 3,000 people to the Vancouver community throughout the three day event. In 2013, the festival went international welcoming two bands from Tsawwassen, British Columbia. Clark College welcomed Dr. Doug Harris as the Festival Director in 2019.



DALE BEACOCK MEMORIAL SWEEPSTAKES AWARD

The Dale Beacock Memorial Sweepstakes Award is given to the finalist ensemble voted by the adjudicators to have presented the best overall performance throughout the entire festival. Additional considerations for the award include the eight adjudication categories:

• Solos • Time

• Intonation • Style and Interpretation

Balance/Blend
 Dynamics

Articulation
 Programming and Presentation

The sweepstakes award trophy was originated in 1963 to recognize the most outstanding band participating at the festival. In the 1970's the sweepstakes award rules were changed to prevent the same band from winning the trophy two consecutive years in a row. Now when a band receives the sweepstakes trophy, they are invited the next year to perform as featured guest artists at the Saturday evening finals. The winning ensemble will remain that year's Sweepstakes Band until the next festival when they, in turn, will pass it on. In 2012, as a tribute to Dale Beacock's contributions as the Clark College Jazz Festival Coordinator, the coveted Sweepstakes Award was renamed The Dale Beacock Memorial Sweepstakes Award.

2023 DALE BEACOCK MEMORIAL SWEEPSTAKES AWARD WINNER

Mountain View High School I, Vancouver, WA, Sam Ormson

The band program at Mountain View High School is led by co-directors Mark Claassen and Sam Ormson. Mountain View has a long history of excellence with the jazz band winning the sweepstakes at the Clark festival in 2023, 2015, and 2012—one of only three schools to win the award three times in the last 25 years. The Jazz program consists of two bands serving over 70 students, all of whom also participate in the concert bands and orchestras at MV. The jazz band has performed at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago, the NAfME Northwest convention and with numerous esteemed artists such as Wayne

Bergeron, Jeff Coffin, Bob Reynolds, Nathan Eklund, and the Count Basie Orchestra. Mountain View maintains a well-balanced and diverse program featuring three concert bands, two orchestras, two jazz bands, a percussion ensemble, and a thriving solo and ensemble program with over 100 entries per year. In 2017 the MVHS program was recognized by the National Band Association as a National Blue Ribbon Award winner for their commitment to excellence in all areas of music making over a sustained period of time.



JAZZ ENSEMBLE ADJUDICATORS

George Colligan is one of the great jazz pianists of his generation, and has earned an international reputation as a multiinstrumentalist (drums, trumpet, organ, keyboards), composer, accompanist, teacher, and bandleader, as well as popular blogger (jazztruth.blogspot.com). Winner of the 2015 DownBeat magazine Critics Poll (Keyboard), he has had a long association with living jazz legend Jack DeJohnette; recent touring took Colligan around the U.S. with "An Evening with Jack DeJohnette and Savion Glover." He has also recently toured the U.S. and Canada as a leader with his trio featuring legends Buster Williams and Lenny White. With over 130 albums to date as an accompanist, Colligan has worked with a long list of jazz greats, including John Scofield, Buster Williams, Cassandra Wilson, Don Byron, Ravi Coltrane, Chris Botti, and many others. His latest album, "King's Dream" (PJCE Records 2022) is his 36th as a bandleader, and features PSU faculty and alumni. Colligan, a New York resident for 15 years, now resides in Portland, Oregon where he is a Full Professor at Portland State University. He has recently won two Region Arts and Culture Council grants, A South Arts Jazz Road grant, and a PSU Faculty Development grant. Colligan recently won the PSU College of The Arts Dean's Council Award for Research, Scholarship and Creativity (2020), and also won the Researcher of the Year Award from the PSU College Of The Arts (2021).

Nate Jorgensen is director of jazz studies at the University of New Hampshire (UNH) where he is responsible for teaching applied saxophone lessons, directs

two jazz ensembles, serves as administrator and coordinator of the Clark Terry Jazz Festival, and is the producer of the UNH Traditional Jazz Series. Jorgensen is an accomplished jazz and classical saxophonist and feels at home in nearly every musical situation. He has had the opportunity to share the stage with notable jazz performers such as Terell Stafford, Bobby Watson, Bobby Shew, Gary Foster, Bob Sheppard, and many others. As the director at UNH he started an annual commissioning project dedicated to his predecessor, Dave Seiler. His bands have premiered new works from composers such as John Clayton, Dan Gailey, John LaBarbera, and Paul Kreuger. The UNH 3 O'Clock Jazz Band released their first CD under Jorgensen's direction in April of 2016 and recently performed at the Montreux Jazz Festival in Montreux, Switzerland, and the Umbria Jazz Festival in Perugia, Italy. He is currently a member of the Capitol Jazz Orchestra based in Concord, NH, and is lead alto of the Portland Jazz Orchestra, based in Portland, ME. Jorgensen holds a DMA from the University of Kansas, a Master of Music from the UMKC Conservatory of Music and Dance, and a Bachelor of Music from the University of Kansas.

Dave Parker is a retired music educator with 44 years of teaching experience. After many years working with high school bands in Ontario, Oregon, Lincoln City, Oregon and Gladstone, Oregon, Dave taught the bands at Clark College in Vancouver, then spent the last 16 years of his career directing the jazz program at University of Portland. He held numerous statewide offices and as President of the Oregon Jazz

Educators, co-founded the first Oregon All State Jazz Band. Dave is currently President of Northwest Bandmasters Association. As director of the University of Portland Jazz Festival, Dave collaborated on writing projects with Patrick Williams, Les Hooper, Lennie Niehaus Dave Wolpe and others. Barnhouse Publishing and Hal Leonard Publishing have published Dave's works. He plays trombone professionally and has recorded with the Art Abrams Swing Machine and others. Dave has a BA from Boise State, and an MMA from University of Northern Colorado where he studied with Buddy Baker.

A New Jersey native, **Deb Schaaf** has built a reputation as an energetic and knowledgeable teacher and clinician within the thriving northwest Jazz Education scene. Deb's bands have won top solo, combo, ensemble and sweepstakes trophies at festivals throughout the Western United States, as well as 2018 and 2019 Outstanding Performance Awards from DownBeat Magazine. Her band was also selected for a featured performance at the 2020 JEN Conference in New Orleans. In 2016, she was nominated by her students and won the 21st Century Fox/ Give a Note Foundation MusicEd Idol Award. She was the founding director of the Jane Addams Middle School Music Department, has served in leadership roles on writing teams for Curriculum and Assessment, and was a Seattle Public Schools Mentor Teacher. Deb is currently the big

band director for Jazz Night School and teaches regularly for Seattle JazzED, as well as playing bari for Big Band Blue. She is currently in a long-term sub position as the orchestra director at Roosevelt High School.

Equally at home in a multitude of musical idioms, Yamaha Performing Artist Allen Vizzutti has visited 70 countries, Japan 49 times, and every state in the union to perform with a rainbow of artists and ensembles including Chick Corea, Doc Severinsen, the NBC Tonight Show Band, the Airmen Of Note, the Army Blues and Army Symphony Orchestra, Chuck Mangione, Woody Herman, Japan's NHK Orchestra and the New Tokyo Philharmonic, the Budapest Radio Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Leipzig Wind Symphony, the Slovenian National Orchestra and the Kosei Wind Orchestra. Performing as a classical and a jazz artist, often in the same evening, he has appeared as guest soloist with symphony orchestras in Japan, Germany, St. Louis, Seattle, Rochester N.Y., Dallas, Milwaukee, Buffalo, Phoenix, Edmonton, Vancouver, Seattle and Minnesota to name a few. From his home in Seattle Washington, Allen's current career activities embody an impressive schedule of recitals, concerts, recording and composing. His writing includes solo pieces for piano, flute, clarinet, saxophone, trombone, tuba, and harp, chamber groups, wind ensemble, jazz ensemble, and symphony orchestra.

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
