Genealogy for Beginners

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Interested in learning who were the people you came from? Take a hands on course in a computer lab to explore how to find your roots and create a family tree. Learn about how different genealogy programs work, both for free and for a price. Examine how to utilize newspapers and old records. Discover many tips and techniques, with an experienced genealogist at your side, who loves being a detective and learning the real backstories! Learn about DNA testing and products and what it means. Required: ability to independently navigate the web.

Learning Objectives: as a result of taking this course, students will:

- 1. Compare and contrast various genealogy resources websites
- 2. Discover how to create a Family Tree
- 3. Explore how to connect historical events to the people you are researching.
- 4. Learn how DNA tests work and what they tell you about yourself.
- 5. Understand how you can take wrong turns doing genealogy research.
- 6. Examine the old records and newspapers for how they uncover clues.
