lark College celebrated the best young musical talent in the region – and welcomed a jazz legend – during the 44th Annual Clark College Jazz Festival held January 26-29 in Gaiser Hall.

Forty-six jazz bands and 13 vocal ensembles performed in this year's Northwest High School Band and Vocal Jazz Competition representing class A through AAAA schools. Local high schools swept the Division 3A vocal jazz category, with Battle Ground, Prairie, and Camas high schools finishing first, second, and third, respectively. The festival sweepstakes trophy was awarded to Seattle's Garfield High School for the most outstand-

ing band participating in the festival.

World-renowned alto saxophonist John Handy was featured in concert on Sunday, January 29. The Grammy-nominated performer and composer has captivated audiences from Carnegie Hall to the Montreaux Jazz Festival with his soulful and fiery saxophone style. Handy was supported in concert by local jazz favorites Greg Goebel on piano, Phil Baker on bass, and Ron Steen on drums, with a special appearance by the Clark College Jazz Ensemble.

Festival organizer and Music Professor/Division Chair Chuck Ramsey was excited to welcome John Handy to Clark College. "He's one of those who set the stage for modern jazz in the 1950s and early '60s," said Ramsey in an interview with *The Columbian*. "This group of people, from this time, you can look back and say, 'This is what jazz is about, and what it's supposed to be about.'



Local High School Students Get A Running Start

n a packed O'Connell Sports Center Gymnasium, cal high school sophomores and juniors learned how to take the next step in their education through Running Start at Clark College by attending an informational meeting on February 1. This annual event frequently attracts hundreds of interested students and parents to the Clark College campus, where they learn about Running Start program requirements including eligibility criteria, testing procedures, and deadlines.

Running Start is a program approved by the Washington legislature which allows qualifying high school juniors and seniors to take classes to earn college credit while they fulfill their high school graduation requirements. Students may choose from a full range of academic and professional or technical courses as long as they meet the criteria and the classes are college-level; tuition for is covered by the school district.

Before a crowd of nearly 1,000 students and parents, Associate Director of Running Start Linda Calvert shared an explanation of Running Start and how to access the program for Fall Quarter 2006. She then introduced two current Running Start students who offered brief "testimonials" as to their Running Start experience. One of those students, Benjamin Hayford, a senior at Fort Vancouver High School, is

also Finance Director of Associated Students of Clark College (ASCC). Hayford, who is majoring in Social Studies, has taken a broad range of courses, including Model United Nations, every quarter. He is on track to earn an Associate of Arts Degree when he graduates from high school in June 2006.

"The Running Start Program was an opportunity to get two years ahead on my college experience," said Hayford. "Running Start has enabled me to grow and become a stronger student – especially in the areas of social sciences, international relations and economics. It's the opportunity to truly get a running start at college."

With more than 900 students currently enrolled, the Running Start Program at Clark College is one of the largest in the state.



Clark Students Score 100% Success

en students from Clark College sat for the national Certified Medical Assistant Examination in October. one of the College's largest groups. All ten passed the exam and are now employed as Certified Medical Assistants. These students' 100% success rate compares to a 67% national success rate for first-time takers. The students scored in the top one percent nationally with an average standard score of 664 (well above the national average of 475). This remarkable accomplishment is due in large part to the dedicated Clark College faculty and staff members who help prepare students so well for the workplace. To quote a member of the Curriculum Committee, "...these are the people that are going to be taking care of us." Penguin Athletic Club (PAC) and Alumni Association in celebrating the 50th anniversary of the College's baseball state championship-winning season at a ceremony on Saturday, February 18 in the O'Connell Sports Center gymnasium. The event will take place during halftime of the men's basketball game with a 3:00 p.m. tip-off.

The 1956 championship series was played against Yakima Junior College on an unnamed field east of Mill Plain Blvd. and Fort Vancouver Way, where passing cars dodged foul balls. As reigning champion, Yakima was favored to take home the title. Clark College pulled off a huge upset, winning the best of three series in two straight games (2-1, 2-1).

The momentous occasion brings together team members from as far away as Arizona along with coach Claude "Skeet" O'Connell, assistant coach Herman Jones, and manager Art Pugsley. O'Connell led four basketball squads, three golf teams, and this one baseball team to state championships in his 40-year career at Clark College. He is ecstatic to reunite with his team, "It will be great to see players I haven't seen since that time and let the community know we're still here." Clark College alumni from the 1950s are also expected to attend the event.

Players will be presented with a replica of their 1956 baseball caps and the official team photo will be recreated. In a very poignant component of the ceremony, the signed winning team ball will be presented to the family of outfielder and Blue Angels Commander Harley H. Hall. Hall's plane was shot down on his third tour of duty in Vietnam and he has been listed as missing in action since 1973. The mounted trophy will go on display in the HH Hall Building in Hazel Dell.

Marylhurst University's PLA Program




In partnership with Marylhurst University, Clark College will hold a free Prior Learning Assessment (PLA) information session this Wednesday, February 15. The session is designed to help adults discover how to earn college credit for the skills, abilities and knowledge they've gained at work and in life. The session will be held from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m. in the Penguin Student Union, room 258.

Marylhurst University's Learning Assessment Center helps adults earn college credit for learning they've acquired outside of the classroom. Up to 45 undergraduate credits can be earned toward a bachelor's degree through Prior Learning Assessment, and an additional 45 credits can be obtained through standardized testing. Marylhurst's Prior Learning Assessment program is nationally recognized. This is the first time an information session about the PLA program has been held in Southwest Washington.

"The recent articulation agreement with Marylhurst University allows Clark College students to earn an undergraduate degree at Marylhurst University with the option to evaluate prior learning for credit," said Dr. Sylvia Thornburg, Clark College's Acting Vice President of Instruction. "This may significantly reduce the cost and the length of time it takes for a Clark College student to move on and earn a bachelor's degree at Marylhurst University."

"Knowledge is gained in many ways besides taking formal courses," said Melanie Booth, Director of Marylhurst University's Learning Assessment Center. "Corporate training, on-the-job experience, community service, parenting, military training, seminars, workshops, volunteer activities and independent research are examples of what can be considered for undergraduate credit."

- ◆ Candidates must be available for several personal interviews.
- ◆ Language knowledge of the country of study is not required, but must be studied after acceptance.
- ◆ Upon completion of studies, the scholar must be available to present highlights of the experience abroad to local Rotary Clubs.

SAVE ON GAS AND PARKING SPACES TAKE ADVANTAGE OF COMMUTE TRIP REDUCTION PROGRAM

The College is committed to reducing the effects upon the environment and infrastructure of the single occupant vehicle as a means of commuting to the College by its employees and students. There are a number of ways employees can participate in the commute trip reduction program. Most options include the additional feature of a guaranteed ride home: (CRT continued)

- Bike riders; there are bicycle racks and bike shelters on campus and bike riders may receive a helmet
- Walkers are eligible for an umbrella
- Bus Riders are eligible for subsidized transit passes (free for one-zone travel!)
- Riders and Van Poolers are also eligible for the guaranteed ride home

Other services in support of the commute trip reduction program include guaranteed ride home, personal laundry pick-up and delivery on campus and use of lockers on campus.

Adjunct faculty and temporary employees who work at least 40 percent time for the College are eligible to participate in the subsidized transit pass program (up to 20 spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis).
