Paul Mason and Jim Harter paid a visit to the Clark Center on the WSUV campus on August 28. Joined by nursing department scholar-ship committee members Shelly Quint, Judy Alleman, and Carol Latta, and Clark College Vice President of Administrative Services, acting CEO, and fellow 40 et 8 member Bob Knight, Mason and Harter toured the newest facility to house Clark's nursing program.

The 40 et 8 is an honor society of the American Legion that maintains 25 quarterly need-based scholarships for Clark College nursing students. Currently the scholarships are \$600 per quarter, with an additional \$100 provided toward licensure examination costs upon graduation. As students graduate from the program, those scholarships are redistributed to current nursing students. The scholarships provide significant assistance for Clark students and represent an annual financial commitment of more than \$46,000 by the 40 et 8, and to date, nearly 500 nursing students have received scholarship

lark College kicked off the 2006-2007 academic year with a campus-wide orientation session to update what's new and what's next for the college. Reinforcing the notion that Clark College exists to serve its students, the focus was on promoting and ensuring student success. Among the list of "what's new" are many improvements to the campus facilities and offerings, including:

- The new Teaching and Learning Center, designed to support and promote teaching excellence for the benefit of our students;
- 10 new classrooms and 20 new faculty offices in Stout Hall;
- The relocation of Health Services to the classrooms previously occupied by the nursing program;
- Opening and use of the new, modern Clark Center facility at the WSU-V campus by the nursing and science & engineering programs;
- Launch of the distance learning and education program;
- A new program review and enhancement plan;
- Opening of the new Welcome Center and renovation of Gaiser Hall;
- The addition of a new one-credit student seminar to assist students with developing skills to ensure college success; and
- New student Welcome Day, scheduled for September 15, to help new students learn the services and programs available to them at Clark.

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Fall Orientation Focuses on Student Success

Clark will continue to take "The Next Step" as it works to develop the following initiatives during the year:

- Implementing a campus-wide signage plan to assist students and visitors to the Clark campus in locating buildings and parking;
- Design of the new east county campus, with building scheduled to begin in July 2007;
- Achieving a wireless campus environment by the end of the academic year;
- Upgrading 25 classrooms with "smart" technology to aid in teaching;
- Completion of an enrollment management plan;
- Course renumbering to maintain consistency between community colleges throughout Washington; and
- Implementation of new retention strategies, including advising requirements, academic planning, an early alert system, and an online module to aid students on probation.

And although it seems a long time off, Clark's 10-year accreditation visit by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NCCU) will be October 2008. Tim Cook and Charlene Montierth are co-chairs of the accreditation steering team. During the next two years, Cook, Montierth, and committee chairs Veronica Brock, Sandra Woodward, Paul Casillas, Gail Liberman, Tami Jacobs, Maxine Mitchell, Roxane Sutherland, Dave Daugherty, Joan Carey, Joy Horning, Miles Jackson, Alex Montoya, Karen Wynkoop, Jim Green, Jennifer Grove, Will Cushwa and Marylynne Diggs will lead a process of self-evaluation to shed light on how well Clark carries out its educational mission and ways we can continue to do so into the future.

Helping Students on their First Days

n an effort to assist students on the first few days of classes, Student Affairs will again be running the successful First Days project by offering extended hours, posting "way-finders" to help students locate buildings and classrooms, and offering early-morning kiosk access.

With the relocation of Registration and Admission services to the Welcome Center and the Cashier's Office move to PSU 162, it will be especially important to assist students in navigating these crucial steps toward enrollment. Greeters will be available in the west and east wings of Gaiser Hall beginning at 6:30 am to assist with questions and way-finding.

And the winner is...

The annual Excellence Awards for faculty and classified staff, and the quarterly classified staff awards for spring and summer, were presented at this fall's employee awards luncheon on September 6. Three faculty members and three classified staff were recognized for their hard work and dedication to student success at Clark College.



All three of the faculty awardees were nominated by students. The first, *Chris Milner*, brings his love and excitement for math to his class and teaches it in a way that is contagious to his students. By using humor, patience and simple explanation to help students understand concepts, he has achieved something unique—he "makes math fun." As one student shared, "Chris Milner is a teacher that really seems to care for his students. He quickly returns homework and especially tests. Students need that feedback ASAP after a test and he never fails to return things the next day."

Newly hired into a tenure-track faculty position, *Brenda Knutson* is one of the primary instructors for the junior dental hygiene students. She provides leadership and positive encouragement to students in a demanding and grueling program. Even when students feel overwhelmed, Knutson is a source of encouragement: "Because Brenda has pride and confidence in us we press on and succeed. Brenda holds us to excellence because she expects nothing less from herself."





Art takes all forms, and for *Beth Heron*, it comes in the form of metal work. Her exceptional skills are matched with an ability to demonstrate them to her students, and she has earned their respect for her ability to oscillate between hard-core welding machines and techniques and the sensitive and delicate skill of jewelry making. Heron's nomination sums up her approach to teaching: "She is always enthusiastic and positive, and I have yet to hear her say a negative word about a student's work. Rather, she accentuates the positive and motivates the student to recognize what the piece has the potential to be."

Classified employees were also recognized for their work and dedication to students. *Joy Horning* of Social Science & Fine Arts won the spring quarter classified excellence award for her positive, patient attitude and the quality and accuracy of her work. Horning's commitment to helping others is also seen through her work to meet the needs of students, faculty, staff and the public. "Her work ethic is one we can all admire and she is someone we can look up to and try to follow her example."

A departmental nomination for *Lynn Schinzing* brought her two well-deserved recognitions: the summer quarter classified award and the annual classified excellence award. Her coworkers cite her great attitude, her written and oral communication skills, and meticulous record-keeping for grants and budgets among her many positive attributes. As the "public face" of Life Sciences, Schnizing represents the entire division well: "Many students have commented on Lynn's very helpful and respectful manner when they come to the office with questions. Lynn once commented that she tries to treat every student that walks through the door with the respect she would always want to see her own son or daughter treated."





The second annual classified excellence award went to *Nell Gladson* of Communications & Marketing. Gladson's award comes at the conclusion of her career at Clark and represents the culmination of six years with the college. She coordinated publication of the college schedules, catalog and program sheets; wrote news releases; researched articles for *Clark 24/7* and the *Clark Journal*; prepared PowerPoint presentations; and assisted with brochures and flyers. She also provided invaluable support to major events including the annual Clark College Women's Conference, the annual Clark College-YWCA Women of Achievement celebration, the college's booth at the Clark County Fair, and commencement. She supported the college community by serving as an officer of the Association of College Employees (ACE). Gladson's nomination gives a glimpse of how she was able to accomplish so much: "Her work on many projects could not have been possible without excellent communication skills and the ability to forge partnerships and foster cooperation across departments and teams."

Open for Business

lark College played a prominent role at the 2006 Governor's Economic and Workforce Development Conference at the Hilton Vancouver Washington on Sept. 7. The event attracted more than 500 registered attendees, the largest turnout in the event's history.

At a breakfast hosted by Clark College and the Washington Workforce Association, acting CEO Bob Knight reminded the audience that Clark College was founded in 1933 by a group of Vancouver businesspeople and encouraged by an English teacher. Knight noted, "It was the time of the Great Depression and, even then, people were looking to educators to train workers to boost the economy. They didn't use the words 'workforce development' but that's what it was."

During her keynote address, Gov. Chris Gregoire outlined her "Next Washington" economic plan. The draft plan is designed to maintain and improve the state's ability to compete in the global economy. The governor highlighted six critical elements of the plan. Education was at the top of the list.

"Education is the single most important economic investment we can make," said Gov. Gregoire. "Investments in education, particularly early childhood education and lifelong learning, have significant economic implications, far into the future, and they are key to helping lowincome families gain ground economically."

The governor and Vancouver Mayor Royce Pollard both praised Clark College for its role in supporting workforce development efforts in southwest Washington, and Clark College's Workforce Development department was among the institutions and businesses recognized for their efforts in supporting and promoting workforce development throughout the state.

As Stetson described it, "Whatever you focus on the most is what you'll create more of."

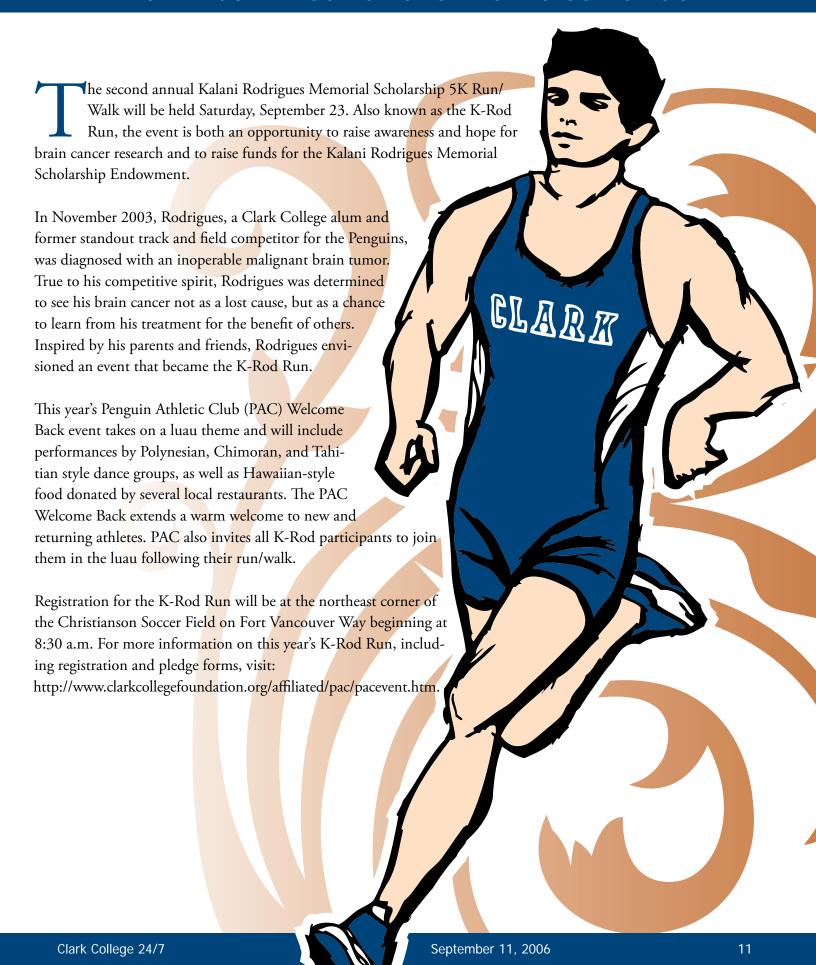

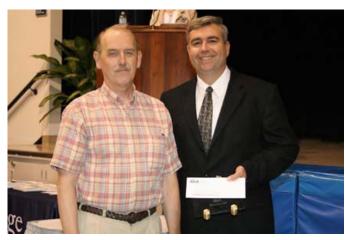
960 Years and Still Going Strong

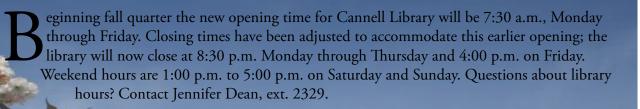

RETIREMENT/RESIGNATION EARLY NOTIFICATION STIPEND

HUMAN

To ensure sufficient time for an effective search for a replacement, the college will provide a one-time stipend to faculty in probationary or tenured positions who provide notification to the college by October 1 prior to the calendar year of retirement or resignation. Probationary or tenured faculty who have at least ten (10) years of service, including temporary, special programs, probationary, and tenured faculty appointments, as of their last date of employment, will receive a \$5,000 stipend; probationary or tenured faculty with less than ten (10) years of service as of their last date of employment will receive a \$3,000 stipend.

To qualify for this payment, the President must receive signed, written notification from the faculty member, including the last date of employment.

SAVE ON GAS AND PARKING SPACES—TAKE ADVANTAGE OF COMMUTE TRIP REDUCTION PROGRAM

Clark College is committed to reducing the effects upon the environment and infrastructure of the single occupant vehicle as a means of commuting to the college by its employees and students. There are a number of ways employees can participate in and benefits to the commute trip reduction program:

- Bike riders may receive a helmet; bicycle racks and bike shelters are available on campus.
- Walkers are eligible for an umbrella.
- Bus riders are eligible for subsidized transit passes (free for one-zone travel).
- Riders and van poolers are eligible for the guaranteed ride home.

Other services in support of the commute trip reduction program include guaranteed ride home, personal laundry pick-up and delivery on campus, and use of lockers on campus.

Adjunct faculty and temporary employees who work at least 40 percent time for the college are eligible to participate in the subsidized transit pass program (up to 20 spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis).

VOLUNTEER REGISTRATION REMINDER

College Administrative Procedure 430.005 requires all volunteers to register in advance with Personnel Services, and to submit time sheets to Payroll at the end of each month in which volunteer services are provided.

Volunteer authorization forms are valid for one fiscal year at a time. Volunteers need to register with Human Resources before performing volunteer services.

FACULTY/STAFF ADDRESS CHANGES

If you change your name, address or telephone number, please complete a name/address change form in Human Resources. Human Resources will forward changes to the Health Care Authority, however, you must notify your medical-dental insurance carriers.

OVERTIME REGULATIONS

Under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act, employers are required to compensate employees who are eligible for overtime for all work they are directed or permitted to perform, including hours worked beyond scheduled work hours; further, liability for compensation is incurred whether the employer knew or should have known that the employee was working.

College employees who are eligible for overtime compensation may not work beyond their regularly scheduled hours unless directed to do so by their supervisors. Supervisors, in turn, are responsible for insuring that employees do not work beyond scheduled hours unless specifically directed to do so. Simply put, employees who are eligible for overtime may not work beyond their scheduled hours, even on a voluntary basis, without receiving overtime pay or compensatory time off, at the employee's option.
