Listening and Learning

A controversial flier spurs new policies, discussion



A college-wide task force has been created to address issues stemming from the distribution of a controversial flier at Clark College.

The flier was originally distributed on October 5 by a student identifying himself as a member of the National Socialist Movement (NSM) organization. The fliers were removed by Security staff members because the student had not followed college procedures for posting or distributing information. Since that time, an additional flier from the same group has been posted on college bulletin boards after being reviewed by the Assistant Attorney General who advises Clark College.

The new task force, which is led by Vice President of Administrative Services Bob Williamson, is exploring how the college can meet its commitments to diversity, safety, academic freedom and freedom of speech. It is expected to provide policy recommendations by the end of winter quarter.

The task force members include Bill Belden, Vice President of Student Affairs; Dr. Kathy Bobula, professor of Early Childhood Education and Psychology;

Dr. Rassoul Dastmozd, Vice President of Instruction; Mark O'Brien, Grounds & Nursery Services Specialist, Facilities Services; Ken Pacheco, Director of Security & Safety; Felisciana Peralta, Multicultural Retention Manager, Student Affairs; Samson Ramirez, President, ASCC; Dr. Darcy Rourk, Associate Vice President of Human Resources; Layne Russell, Professor, Paralegal; and Dian Ulner, Professor, Women's Studies.

This month, the Cultural Pluralism Committee will unveil recommendations for new protocols for students who feel threatened by bias-based incidents at the college.

On Monday, October 18, the college hosted an open dialogue to allow members of the college community and individuals from the greater community to express their views and concerns about the flier and related events in a public forum. In his opening remarks, Clark College President Bob Knight said, "There's been a lot of discussion at the college, some heated debate. The purpose of this meeting is to figure out: How are we going to move forward? We want to learn from this."

The first person to speak was the student who had originally handed out the fliers. Wearing a dark blue military-looking uniform with a swastika armband and Iron Eagle shoulder insignia, he proclaimed that the NSM was a “not a party of hate, it is a party of love.” He then read the flier aloud. It focused on what the organization has described as “white pride” and cited achievements of white individuals throughout history.

A few murmurs could be heard from the audience, but the room was generally quiet while the student spoke. Afterward, however, another student asked: “If this is a movement of love, why are you wearing a swastika?”

Some speakers focused on safety concerns. Early Childhood Development professor Debi Jenkins said that some students of color feel unsafe at the college because of the fliers. In a written statement shared by Women’s Studies professor Dian Ulner, instructor Ann Virtu Snyder wrote, “Did these fliers hurt anyone? Yes. They hurt everyone.”

Other speakers cautioned against creating an atmosphere of censorship at the college. One Mature Learning student cited the famous quotation, “I detest what you have to say, but I would defend to the death your right to say it,” adding afterward, “There’s nothing in freedom of speech that protects us from stupidity.”

The discussion included criticism of President Knight and the college’s administration for not responding more quickly and forcefully to the initial flier. Following the forum, the president acknowledged the criticism in a message to the college community.

He said, “I understand more clearly that ... many in the college community wanted and needed to hear directly from me. They needed to know what was happening and how the college was responding. Because I did not respond—immediately and personally—it caused uneasiness and even fear, and I apologize for that.”

Knight added, “Clark College is a learning institution....We are all learning, including the President....More than ever, I am convinced that, by working together, we will become a stronger and better institution.”

Since the open dialogue, a disclaimer has been posted on all Clark bulletin boards. It reads:

Clark College is committed to academic freedom and a respectful discussion of issues and ideas.

The College has a strong commitment to diversity and creating a safe and welcoming environment for all. The posting of a flyer on this board does not represent an endorsement, either implicit or explicit, of views or opinions contained in the flyer by the College, its students, its faculty, its college personnel, its administration or its Board of Trustees.

Our Diversity Plan Vision: Clark College recognizes, understands, confronts and challenges the institutional systems of privilege, power and inequality so that all members of the Clark College community can support student success.

Meet Clark's New Trustee

Jada Rupley joins the Clark College Board of Trustees

Jada Rupley, Associate Superintendent for Children, Youth and Family Services at ESD 112, has been named to the Clark College Board of Trustees. Rupley succeeded Addison Jacobs.

At ESD 112, Rupley is directly responsible for diverse programs serving populations ranging from early childhood to at-risk adolescents and adults. These include early learning and child care programs, alternative school programs for at-risk students, truancy projects in Clark and Cowlitz counties, youth workforce and training programs for 16-24 year olds, and a four-state national and community service AmeriCorps program that provides service in education and the environment for members 18 years of age and older.

In addition to her principal and superintendent credentials, Rupley holds bachelor's and master's degrees in psychology and K-12 education from Central Washington University and a master's degree in school administration from Seattle Pacific University.

Rupley, who currently resides in Camas, has lived in Clark County since 1987. She is very active in the community, serving on the Clark County Skills Center Advisory and the Clark County Aging Task Force. She is a former co-chair of the Washington Early Learning Advisory Council and a former member of both the Clark County Planning Commission and the Leadership Clark County Board.

"I know that Jada's experience at a valued K-12 educational partner will be a wonderful asset to the Board of Trustees and the college," said Clark College President Robert K. Knight.



Ready for Reading

Town Plaza hosts an open house in honor of Literacy Week



Over the course of two evenings, some 60 students attended an open house at Clark College at Town Plaza to learn about the power of reading. The event, held October 18 and 19, was in honor of the Fifth Annual Washington State Literacy Week, which ran October 18-24. Themed “Literacy: A Family Affair,” it emphasized the importance of family involvement in all stages of literacy.

Clark College faculty and staff facilitated a series of workshops and activities. Student Learning Center Program Manager Suzanne Smith gave a lively demonstration of how to read to your children, in the process showing how families can make reading time more enjoyable—and how that can help their children succeed.

Another popular workshop was taught by Associate Director of Basic Education Hannah Abraham-Shea, who addressed how students’ own emotions, if improperly handled, can hold them back from achieving their goals. She offered a variety of ways to control and conquer negative feelings, while reinforcing belief in one’s own ability to achieve success.

The event also featured workshops by ESL faculty member Jackie Allen-Bond; Holly Forrest of Clark’s Mature Learning department; and Pathways Program Manager Tiffany Williams.

The event was also supported by organizations outside of Clark College. Guest presenter Corina McEntire of Educational School District (ESD) 112 delivered a powerful workshop, “Parents as Teachers.” Parents, she stressed, are a child’s first and best teacher. By understanding each stage of a child’s development, parents can capture the teachable moments and help improve their child’s skills in many essential areas.

Thanks to a generous donation from the Children’s Book Bank of Portland, Clark College was able to provide each attending family with a free children’s book to take home. Books were also given away as prizes for the literacy-based games that were played in the breaks between workshops. Family literacy handouts were provided for all age levels in eight languages.

Illiteracy is a growing problem in Clark County. According to the 2000 US Census data, 8 percent of Vancouver residents—more than 22,500 people—over the age of 16 lack basic literacy skills.

SHINING A "SPOTLIGHT" ON CLARK COLLEGE

Clark College has been honored by the Portland Metro Chapter of the Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) for its comprehensive efforts to successfully open Clark College at Columbia Tech Center (CTC).

During the 2010 Spotlight and Awards of Distinction ceremony, the college received two Spotlight Awards: one for the college's overall efforts in planning and opening CTC, the other for the community open house held prior to CTC's opening. The award submissions reflected the work done by the entire college community to successfully plan, design, construct and open CTC.

The event, which was held on October 28 at the Leftbank Annex in Portland, drew nearly 180 communications professionals from throughout the region. KGW-TV's Russ Lewis emceed the event.

This is the second consecutive year that the college has been honored during this awards ceremony, which showcases the best public relations work in Oregon and Southwest Washington as judged by nationally recognized and accredited PR professionals. The college earned three awards last year for its 75th anniversary and related projects.

Other honorees included organizations as diverse as the Oregon Department of Transportation, Intel, Portland General Electric, Legacy Health and Longview Fibre as well as public relations firms such as Edelman, CMD Agency, and Watershed Communications.

MORE HONORS FOR CLARK

Clark College was also honored during the annual awards ceremony of District 7 of the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations (NCMPR).

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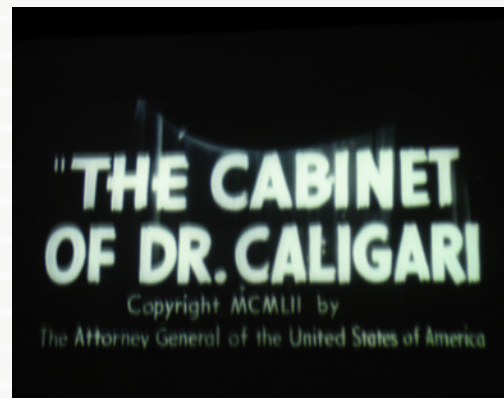
NCMPR is the association of communicators at two-year colleges. NCMPR District 7 includes colleges in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, and the Canadian provinces of Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Yukon Territory.

The college earned two gold medallions, one for the *Clark 24/7* newsletter and one for a photograph of students that appeared on the back cover of the summer 2010 schedule (*above*). The college won a silver medallion in the banners/ outdoor media category for the design of a new recruitment banner. The college also earned a silver medallion for the “maze” television spot, which ran on Comcast in Southwest Washington, in support of fall enrollment. Additionally, the college earned a silver medallion in the media success category for its media efforts related to the opening of Clark College at Columbia Tech Center.
