Clean Slate

Clark College begins the year with a new anti-littering campaign

ith growing enrollment, Clark College's new influx of students have brought all sorts of benefits to the campus: their enthusiasm, their curiosity, their diversity.

But there's one other thing they've brought with them that many community members wish they hadn't: their trash.

"With a lot more students, there's a lot more litter—it's as simple as that," sighed Grounds Manager Skip Jimerson. "We walk around the parking lot every morning and we pick up a whole bag full of trash. And lately it's been more like a bag and a half—and that's six people doing that, so a bag and a half multiplied by six."

The college has taken steps to alleviate the problem. It's set up cigarette-butt receptacles at corners where smokers congregate. Facilities staff has striven to keep the grounds clean. After all, Clark College takes great pride in the beauty of its main campus and in all of its locations.

Unfortunately, littering continues to be a problem. So the college is launching a fresh effort to encourage students, faculty, and staff to take personal responsibility for their actions and demonstrate pride in their college. The goal: to remind people not to throw debris—especially cigarette butts but also including food wrappers, paper, cans, bottles, or other trash—onto the grounds at Clark College.

This initiative joins Clark's Healthy Penguin Nation, "green" (sustainability) programs, Earth Day programs, service learning and more. It's starting with new signs that you'll spot at all Clark location. Other potential elements include new trash and cigarette receptacles, student outreach during the first day of each quarter, and "college cleanup" volunteer days.



Noting that Clark College is located in Vancouver's Central Park, Health Services Officer Mary Deal, who sits on the task force, said, "It's about being a good neighbor."

"They can model good behavior," said Vice President of Administrative Services Bob Williamson, also on the task force. "They can remind students not to litter. We have staff who are smokers and they put their cigarette butts in the proper container."

November Student Athletes of the Month

Two Clark students race to the top

heir teams enjoy championship seasons. Now, student athletes Cameron Falkner and Briel Thoune have been honored as the November 2010 "Athletes of the Month" at Clark College.

Cross country coach Ryan Hovde praised Cameron Falkner for placing second overall as an individual competitor and for leading the men's team to a Southern Regional Championship Title in Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) competition.

"Cameron's performance gave Clark back-to-back regional titles," Hovde said. "Cameron is a strong competitor whose talent runs deep. Only a freshman, Cameron has a bright future ahead of him."

This was Briel Thoune's first competitive season in cross country—a season in which the Clark women's team won the NWAACC championship. Coach Hovde said, "Briel consistently ranked in the top five for all individual female runners in the NWAACC conference and took second place honors in the Southern Regional championships. She can look forward to a great future as a distance runner."

The Student Athlete of the Month program recognizes both the academic and athletic achievements of Clark's student athletes. Two recipients are selected each month by a committee that includes Clark College coaches, athletic department personnel, and fellow students.

Each honoree receives a jacket with his or her name engraved on it. The jackets are provided by Les Schwab through its support of the "Student Athlete of the Month" program, in partnership with Clark's Penguin Athletic Club and the Clark College Foundation.

RETIREMENT OPTION

Interested in transferring to Plan 3? Every January qualified Plan 2 members of PERS or TRS have the opportunity to transfer to Plan 3. The deadline for transferring is January 31, 2010. SICK LEAVE BUYOUT

Under the provisions of Administrative Procedure 635.025 and the WPEA CBA, eligible employees who have balances of more than 480 hours of compensable sick leave as of December 31, 2010, may choose to convert unused sick leave hours accrued in 2010 to monetary compensation. Any sick leave hours used during 2010 are deducted from the hours that are available to convert.

Compensation is calculated at the rate of 25% of the employee's current hourly rate. Employees who choose to participate in the buyout must be compensated for all eligible sick leave hours earned in 2010, not just a portion of them.

Employees considering buyout should be aware that the College is now able to offer a VEBA program to retirees which allows sick leave buyout dollars to be transferred to a VEBA account, tax free, to be used to pay for medical expenses.

Sick leave buyout application forms are available in Human Resources; the deadline for submitting completed forms is January 31, 2011. Payment will be received on February 25, 2011. Please call Thao Schmidt, x2628, or Pagean Pallamounter, x2119, for additional information.
