Safety Net

Dwight Hughes Tackles Cybersecurity during Clark's Faculty Speaker Series

In 2008, cybercrime cost private companies \$1 trillion, and that's only what was reported. That stunning statistic was one of the highlights of a presentation on cybersecurity by Professor Dwight Hughes to a standing-room-only crowd on October 17. His lecture, the first of the academic year in Clark's annual Faculty Speaker Series, was the culmination of research he had gathered while on sabbatical.

Hughes explained why online security is a growing concern worldwide and an issue that Clark College should pay attention to. "One-fourth of cyber attacks happen in the United States," he said.

Through statistics and news reports, Hughes showed how the growing cyber threat is also creating a new class of in-demand careers. He shared his vision for a potential cybersecurity program that could be offered at Clark—one that would involve partnerships with local and national four-year colleges and would require expansion of existing courses and programs Clark already offers.

While Hughes encouraged the Clark community to move quickly to become a leader in this emerging field, he acknowledged that his research was only the beginning in the process of developing a new program.

"These are true Vision 2020 jobs, yet they're needed now," he said. "But Clark is doing so much that we want to make sure when we do [start this program], we do it well."

Hughes also answered questions from the audience, ranging from what skills employers are looking for in cybersecurity professionals to how to protect personal investments online.

The next Faculty Speaker Series lecture will be on February 19, when Dr. Rob Schubert presents "Monkeys, Mangos and Modernization: Village-Centered Conservation in Rural Ghana."

Talking Tech

At Techtoberfest, faculty instruct each other about technology

A handful of instructors gathered around history professor Dr. Katherine Sadler as she pointed to her laptop. Sadler was walking them through her online history class, which she had designed to include features like online “field trips” to relevant websites and online journals in which students had to take on the personae of fictional characters throughout history.

“Oh my gosh!” exclaimed one instructor as she read a journal entry. “And they’re actually doing it—they’re really taking on these characters.”

“The students really get into it,” Sadler said. “For me, this is the most fun assignment I’ve ever designed.” There was only one snag, she added—students never seemed to click on one of the field trip destinations that she thought had some of the most educational value for them.

“You should try listing it first,” librarian Kitty Mackey suggested.

Sadler’s jaw dropped. “Oh my gosh, I didn’t think of that!” she said. “Of course!”

This was exactly the kind of knowledge sharing that Techtoberfest was designed to promote. Hosted jointly by the Teaching and Learning Center (TLC) and eLearning, the event was an opportunity for faculty to learn about new technological teaching tools—including Google Plus, iPads, and Moodle—from fellow instructors who were already using them.

TLC Program Coordinator Lorraine Leedy said that emerging technology was a topic the center had wanted to cover for a while. She added that she hoped to continue the event on a quarterly basis. “We want it to be a faculty development event,” she said.


