Getting Started at Clark: Admissions and Residency

Admissions

The Welcome Center is your first step toward starting your educational career at Clark College. The Welcome Center serves as your one-stop-shop for admissions, student recruitment, college visits and student ambassadors, and registration in one convenient location.

Admission Requirements

Students must meet one of the following requirements in order to be admitted to Clark College:

- 18 years of age or older or;
- * A graduate of an accredited high school or the equivalent (GED).

Students may apply for admission one of two ways:

- Online at www.clark.edu/quickstep
- Complete a paper application and submit to the Welcome Center in person or by mail.

Residency Requirements

For Washington

A Washington resident is defined as someone who has resided continuously in the state of Washington for at least 12 months prior to enrolling at Clark College. Students who have lived in the state of Washington for less than 12 months may qualify for the Washington non-resident waiver. For additional information, please contact the Welcome Center.

For Oregon

Clark College offers resident tuition to students who reside in a qualifying Oregon border county. To qualify, a student must reside in the Oregon border county for at least 90 days before enrolling at Clark College and remain living in an Oregon border county during their attendance at Clark College.

Financial Aid, Tuition & Fees

Financial Aid

Have you been wondering how to pay for college? Financial aid may be the answer! Financial aid helps eligible degree- or certificate-seeking students obtain funds to help pay for educational expenses while they go to college. Clark College offers a variety of federal, state, institutional, and private financial aid programs.

Types of financial aid available to Clark College students include:

Student Loans

The Stafford Loan program offers two types of loans: subsidized and unsubsidized. With subsidized loans, the government pays the interest for you while you're in school. With unsubsidized loans, you are responsible for paying the interest while you are in school. Once you have finished your education, you then pay back your student loans.

Grants are based on financial need and do not need to be repaid. Grants at Clark College include the Federal Pell Grant, the Washington State Need Grant, and the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG).

Tuition Waiver & Clark College Grant

The tuition wavier and the Clark College grant are awarded to eligible Washington residents enrolled at least half-time (six credits per quarter) and have demonstrated exceptional financial need. These waivers and grants cover tuition only - not fees, books, or supplies.

Work Study

This program allows students to earn money to pay for education expenses by working in a qualified position. Work study jobs may be on or off campus. Whenever possible, the work study position will be related to your academic or professional/technical interest.

Sponsored Programs

The Office of Financial Aid at Clark College serves as a central point of contact for current and future students attending Clark under the sponsorship of agencies such as active duty military, AmeriCorps, Department of Services for the Blind, Department of Social and Human Services (DSHS), Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, Labor & Industries, Veterans Vocational Rehabilitation, and WorkSource programs (TRA/NAFTA/WIA).

Veterans Affairs



How to Apply for Financial Aid

To apply for federal student financial aid you must complete and submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) each year that you attend school. The quickest and easiest way to do this is online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. To complete the FAFSA online you will need a personal identification number (PIN), which is also available through the FAFSA Web site. Paper versions of the FAFSA are also available at the Clark College Welcome Center and Financial Aid Office. Be sure to list the Clark College Federal School Code (003773) on your FAFSA so we will receive your information.

In addition to completing and submitting the FAFSA, you must also complete and submit the following in order to be considered for financial aid:

- Complete and submit the Clark College Application for Admissions; and


What makes your students special?

SPETLIGHT

"I am the middle child of a family of five. I was born in El Paso, Texas, in the early 1960s to Catholic Mexican parents that never even finished high school – and who were two of the hardest working people I will ever meet. It was my father's desire for his daughters to meet and marry honest, hard working men to take care of us while my oldest brother was encouraged to get as much education as he could. When my father uprooted his family to the east side of San Jose, California, life changed for our tight-knit family. My father was diagnosed with lung cancer a couple of years after we arrived. His thinking changed after watching my mom struggle with all the issues that she was not prepared to deal with. He realized that life is so unpredictable that we (his girls) must not depend on anyone but ourselves. He passed away soon after that – but not before implanting in me the desire, the love of knowledge, and the drive of getting it. It was known as our Si Se Puede drive."

Why did you choose to Return to Learn?

"My oldest son, Martin, was enrolled at Clark; he kept hearing me say how I needed to go back to school. My two younger children were getting older and my job was showing evidence of the times changing. He would bring me class catalogs and financial aid packets every new quarter, but I kept putting it off and putting it off. He never stopped pushing me and encouraging me. He knew that I could do it. When my daughter was bringing home homework that I could not help her with anymore, I knew that something had to be done. I needed to keep up with her. I would not allow her or her younger brother to struggle through school and get discouraged because they didn't get it. Finally I decided to take the first step. I attended a welcome to Clark College night. Something stirred my blood that day and I knew that my life was about to change. I took the next step – taking the assessment test – and then I applied for aid and got it. I picked my classes, got my books and attended the first day with a huge Si Se Puede attitude – an attitude that teachers, and other classmates, and especially my family, could see me displaying. It was a little strange at first, going to school with kids younger or the same age as your own kids. I noticed early on that older students are a little more committed. We have had the realities of life demands and what it takes to make everything flow together. We know too well deadlines and commitments. We adjust well to bumps in the roads and can bounce back quickly. I am glad that I waited a little later in life – it's like the saying you are never too old to learn."

Co-Admissions Programs

Assessment Center


Clark College Campus Locations
