## Strong appointed to Clark College Board of Trustees

## Appointee described as strong community advocate for education and inclusion

As Chief Diversity Officer for Clark County, Strong leads the county's efforts to integrate diversity and inclusion measures into policy and practice in the county. She is currently the committee chair of the Clark County Diversity Advisory Committee and the Clark County Diversity Steering Committee. She is co-chair of the 2012 Northwest Public Employ-

ees Diversity Conference and serves on the board of We Reign.

Strong has also been an active volunteer in the region, serving as an advisor for the American Society for Training and Development Cultural Competency Team, a board member and diversity team chair for the American Red Cross of Southwest Washington and a personnel committee member for YWCA Clark County. She has also served on the Big Brothers Big Sisters Columbia Northwest African American Advisory Committee, the City of Battle Ground Diversity Task Force, and the Portland State University Social Justice Committee.
