She studied photography at Mountain View High School and Clark College before moving to Seattle to earn a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary visual arts. It was there she became interested in video art and film. Friberg's passion for art then took her to San Francisco, where she worked at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art until resigning to focus on her craft.

Friberg already has her 2009
intentions planned, and they
include growing her freelance
photography business; submitting
"Mathematics for Plants" to other
festivals; bringing emerging artists
to Gallery Extraña, her and her
boyfriend's art gallery; and fronting the band Beno+Minnie.

The Havana film festival may have been her first international screening, but it won't be her last,

Friberg said.

"It's just the beginning."
