A Camas resident is among a talented group of Clark County residents to earn the 2008 Women of Achievement award.

Elizabeth Asahi Sato, owner of the Camas consulting company "Rise to Excellence," was selected as one of eight to receive the award presented by Clark College and the YWCA Clark County. The designation recognizes and honors local women for their outstanding community contributions.

According to a press release, Sato was born in Yokohama, Japan, and raised in Portland with two brothers and four sis-

ters. Her family often struggled to make ends meet, and felt the burden of racial

inequality.

"My father was born in the early 1900s and grew up very poor, so he instilled in us the importance of working hard and being a person of integrity," she said. "My mother always told us that we were smart and had value. She gave us a sense of personal pride."

Sato graduated from Parkrose High School in Portland, and went on to attend the University of Oregon, where she served on the Commission for the


Rights of Minorities. At the age of 19, she was appointed to the Oregon State Board of Education by then Gov. Vic Ativeh. She attended school at Waseda University in Tokyo, and later graduated from the U of O with a degree in political science and a minor in ethnic

Sato said her life has been filled with challenges, but she never doubted her ability to achieve — a philosophy she

hopes to pass on to others.

"No matter what circumstance you find yourself in, you can overcome any odds if you truly believe you can," said the single mother of three sons. "You can overcome and excel if you understand that there have been many before

you whom you can call upon for guidance and many ahead of you who will learn — from you."
